AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR

Reason: For gallantry in action: Pixet Sergeant Melton distinguished himself on 6 February 1966 while serving as a Piret Sergeant during a company assault on the village of Canh Winn. Remultic of Vietnam. At approximately 1400 hours, as First Streegard Melton's company moved from a river bed, a Viet Cong Norce unleashed a devastating volume of automatic measure fire from well-fortified bunkers. First Sergeant Meiton immediately joined the company assault line, exposed himself to the intense Viet Cong fire as he moved from man to man, shouting words at encouragement, and directed fire on the hostile emplacements. First Sergeant Melton's inspiring leadership motivated the mem and caused them to keep the assault line moving aggressively. When they neared the village, First Sergeant Meltur rejained the command element and assisted in the control of the unit. As they moved across a clearing, he discovered a semiously wounded soldier. Despite the interse Viet Cong fire, First Sergeant Melton carried the wounded pan 35 meters to the enfety of a dike. When two companies were pinned down by intense bostile fire from mutually supporting Viet Cong bunkers, First Sergeant Melton moved aggressively to mithin 10 meters of one bunker, threw a grenade into it, killed four Viet Cong. and destroyed the bunker. He then placed suppressive fire on two other bunkers while the elements of the companies advanced and destroyed the bunkers with hand greenades. Later, First Sargeant Molton organized the two elements into one unit and destroyed a final bunker. First Sergeant Melton's unimpeachable value in close combat against a hostile force was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reliebots great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.
