AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR

1. TC 320. The following AWAID is announced.

Date Action: 25 February 1967 Theater: Republic of Vietnam

Reason: For gallantry in action against an armed hostile force on 25 February 1967 near Song Mao, Republic of Vietnam. Lieutonant Belding's platoon was air-lifted into an arca where a blocking action was to be set up. After landing, the platoon last the landing more and moved down a jungle trail. Approximately eleven hundred maters away from the landing zone, the polar man encountered three hostile soldiers. Both elements harman firing at the same time. Lieutenant Bolding quickly deplayed the platoon and started manuevering them toward this ensury force, when the right flank orupted into a hail of hostile Mire. Fefore he could effect a roorganisation of his platoon, to cope with the fire from the right flank, the left flank also crea under heavy fire. Receiving fire from three sides, Licutement Belding began to move the plateen to the rear so that the ran could replenish their aumunition, which was stored back at the landing zone with the rest of the equipment. A small clamera of insurgents had maneuvered behind them, leaving the friendly platoon completely surrounded and cut off from their course of supply. With total disregard for his personal callety. Lienterrant Bolding rushed through the intersive hall of flue and began directing the fire of his men. After identifying the . targets, Licutement Belding called in artillery and exposed himself to the hostile fire. After calling in air strikes, he moved through the area, under fire, giving aid to the wounded and comforting them as best he could. The air strikes once led with the renewed efforts of the platoon, resulted in the retreat of the enemy forces. Lieutenant Belding then directed the preparation of a landing zone for the evacuation of the wounded personnel. Lieutenent Felding's heroic actions while engaged in close combat with a numerically superior hostile force were in keeping with the highest traditions of the milltary service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, Tack Force Oregon and the United States imp.
