## AWARD OF THE SUVER STAR

Awarded: Silver Star

Date action: 13 August 1967 Theater Republic of Vietnam

Resson: For gallarery in action against a hostile force on 13 August 1967 in the Republic of Victors. Second Lieutenant Petramalo distinguished Maself by his uspensileled determination and personal sacrifice. Puring a heliborne assault Lieutenant Petramiors platoon encountered an enemy minofield in the landing come. The platoon began to probe the minefield and cautiously maneuver through it when they were brought under extremely heavy automatic weapons fire. The enemy fired from three directions and pircod the squad down. With complete disregard for his eva safety, Lieutenant Petramalo ruched forward through the bail of bestile fire to the front elements of his plotoon and led them through the minefield to a covered position, Still or posed to the enemy fire, he moved from positive to position directing covering fire for the remainder of the Platon as they crossed the open minefield. Realising that he was engaged with a numerically superior force, is sutement Petramalo ence again braved the intense fire to reach his radio telephone operator and eall in effective arillery supporting fire. Seeing that one of his usen lay wounded in an area exposed to the hostile fire, ". Misutement Petremalo ence again, with utter disregard for his own safety while exposing himself to enemy fire, ran ferment to the aid of the wounded can. At this time Lieutenant Pellamalo was mortally wounded. Lieutenent Petramalors unquestionable display of valor and the devetion to duty while engaging a macriof lly superior hoatile force in close contat were in keeping with the floost traditions of the military service and reflected the whost credit area binself, Task Force Oregon, and the United States Army.
