AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR (POSTHIMOUS)

Awarded: The Silver Star (Posthumous)

Reason: For gallantry in action while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam on 9 June 1969. Private Bean distinguished himself while serving as a medical aidman with Company C, 1st Pattalic (Airmobile), 501st Infantry, during a search and clear operation in the vicinity of Tam Ky, Quang Tin Frevince, Republic of Vietnam. On the cited date, Comrany C was suddenly subjected to intense enemy machine gun fire from North Vietnamese Army resulars. Immediately an element of Company C began employing fire and movement tactics in an attempt at neutralizing the enemy position, but the insurgents retaliated with intense rocket procedled grenade and machine gun fire. When one man was wounded by shrannel from an exploding grenade, Private Beam began to maneuver toward him. He then came under intense machine gun fire and was forced to seek cover. Meanwhile, the main maneuvering element of Company C initiated another assault on the insurrent positions. Behind the sumpressive machine gum fire of the main maneuvering element, Private Bean grawled forward into the oren to his wounded comrade. Disregarding his own safety, he subjected himself to the enemy fire as he remained in the oren admiristering first aid to the wounded man. When the insurgent rosition gained fire superiority, he attempted to drag the wounded man to safety. Cognizant of the fact that his life was in 'eccardy, he refused to leave the wounded man behind. A short distance from his objective, Private Bean was again subhjectedto intense machine run fire and was mortally wounded. His dauntless courage and self-sacrificing smirit were an inspiration to all the men of his platoon. Private Bean's personal bravery and devotion to duty were in keening with the highest traditions of the mi itary service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.
